


Survey Summary


- The community survey was conducted in May of 2016.




Do you live in the Beaver Dam Unified School District?




Are you an employee of the Beaver Dam Unified School District?




Do you currently have child(ren) attending the District?




If you have school-aged children, what school(s) do they attend?




In which city or township do you reside?



Facility Planning Background

The comprehensive facility study completed in 2011 by Plunkett Raysich Architects identified critical facility needs throughout the District. To date, the District has completed \$10 million of the priority 1 projects, including:

- Upgraded the District-wide technology infrastructure
- Added 6 classrooms onto Prairie View Elementary
- Replaced roof sections
- Repaired parking lots
- Remodeled the high school science-wing (as seen below left)
- Upgraded heating, cooling and electrical systems at our middle school (as seen below right)






Beaver Dam tax mill rate, which is used to calculate property taxes, is among the lowest in this region.





Comprehensive Plan






